## EARL STONHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



So far this winter we have got off lightly with the weather, with a bonus week of sunshine in February, but if it does turn wintry at least it won't last long.

It was agreed by the Parish Council that grit bins were not necessary in the village:

parishes can no longer have simple piles of grit delivered for use in icy weather. They are required to apply for a grit bin which has to be in a very specific site at a considerable cost. The main roads are efficiently gritted by Suffolk County Council and we would not be able to have enough roadside grit for all the icy areas, plus there is an issue as to who would spread the grit.

Many thanks to the WI for arranging the Carol Service on the green and also Karl and his helpers for doing the tree, which looked beautiful once again for the whole of December.

Many of you footpath walkers will have noticed footpaths cleared across fields; this has been done to conform with the rights of way rules that landowners must comply to. Please keep to the brown spray off area and not trespass on to crops which could be damaged. The footpath sign that has fallen down opposite Larters Lane has been reported but it might take some time for it to be restored.

I have recently moved to Stowupland but as I live within three miles of the Parish, I can still stand for the Parish Council and will be doing so for the time being.



Other plants which we will be selling this year include, amazing Aquilegias. carefree Campanulas, delightful Delphiniums, everlasting Echinacea, groundcovering Geraniums, grand Grasses, heavenly Heleniums, irresistible Irises, lovely Lupins, pretty Paeonies, funky Phlox, super Salvias and vertical Verbena.

As I sit to write this month's column, the first real cold snap of the year has brought us snow and ice, but thankfully bringing minimal disruption. I'd like to pay special tribute to our dedicated highways teams who are working, often in treacherous and freezing conditions, around the clock, to keep Suffolk's roads safe and accessible for all of us.

Living in a predominantly rural county like Suffolk, our road infrastructure is simply vital in connecting our rural communities and enabling those who live and work here to travel easily to and from school, our places of work, to visit friends and family and to access local services, such as hospital appointments or local facilities. That's why I am committed to doing all that I can to support our County Council colleagues and my fellow MPs in lobbying Government for much needed cash to improve and maintain our road network.

I was delighted that back in October, the Chancellor made an additional £420 million available for local authorities in England to spend on road maintenance. One of the most common issues coming through my mailbox and post-bag are issues relating to Highways complaints and I know that this money will deliver some much needed and real on-the-ground improvements to our road network here in Suffolk. I'm looking forward very much to visiting our dedicated Highways Team at Suffolk County Council soon to see how this money is being put to good use.

Working with our local councils and Chamber of Commerce, I have also helped to secure £3.8 million of Government funding for improvements to the A140 at Eye. This money has been awarded to Suffolk County Council to deliver the project and works are due to be completed by 31 March 2020. The A140 is a vital economic route and these improvements will go some way in helping to further boost the area's economic potential, not to mention vastly improving road safety on this busy and fast moving stretch of road.

Finally, alongside my fellow East Suffolk MPs and the Leader of Suffolk County Council, I was pleased to meet with Roads Minister, Jesse Norman, in pressing the urgent case for improvements to the A12 and more specifically, for a Four

Villages Bypass. There has been a strong case for a Four Villages Bypass for many years now, but with such a bypass likely to cost in excess of £150 million, the funding requirement is significant and will require all those involved to work collaboratively in order to match fund any potential Government money.

I will continue to do all that I can to support our District and County Council colleagues in ensuring that Suffolk's needs, in terms of infrastructure, remain firmly on the Government's radar.

## **County Councillor's Report**



Green light to develop more specialist education placements in Suffolk

On 29 January 2019, Suffolk County Council's Cabinet agreed recommendations to move forward with creating more specialist education places in Suffolk. Suffolk will need between 300 to 400 places for children with additional needs between now and 2020, and this figure is likely to continue to increase. The demand for specialist education places in

Suffolk is rising rapidly due to the county's population growth, advances in medicine, and the increasing complexity of specialist needs. The recommendations include three new special schools and 36 specialist units attached to existing mainstream schools, which combined will create over 800 new specialist education places in the county. Following the approval of the recommendations, the proposal to borrow up to £45.1 million to fund the new places will now go to the county council's Capital Strategy Group to be reviewed. If agreed, the decision will go back to Cabinet in the Spring for final sign-off so the recommendations can be rolled out.

SCC is committed to ensuring all of Suffolk's children and young people are able to attend a good local school, one that meets their individual needs and supports them to achieve their full potential regardless of the challenges they may face. This decision will help to create hundreds of more specialist school places across the county, reducing our dependence on placements outside of Suffolk, which come at a high cost, and transforming the experience of education for our children and young people with SEND.

## Suffolk's roads warming to £300,000 thermal patching technology

Suffolk Highways is celebrating road repair success following a £300,000 investment in Nu-phalt Thermal Patching technology. The investment, which has been funded from the extra £9.67 million received from central government in the autumn, has aided the county's Highways teams to carry out more effective, longer-lasting repairs to Suffolk's road surface. Over the last month, Suffolk Highways has deployed three thermal road repair machines

which have repaired approximately 1,700 potholes county-wide. The process includes an eight-minute heating cycle of the road surrounding the defect allowing for the existing road surface to be heated to 200 Celsius. The surface is then raked, topped up with bitumen binder and pre-heated material, then compacted. This all takes place within the service's much-favoured 15-minute temporary closure. The process does not require excavation of the highway, meaning no dust or noise, and better still, no waste material. The result also means there are no surface joints, which can be prone to faster deterioration.

Beyond the investment in Nu-phalt Thermal Patching technology, the £9.67m of funding will enable a programme of work. This includes improvements and repairs to the pavements in the town centres of Stowmarket, Felixstowe and Haverhill and drainage work to solve long-term flooding problems on the A12 - Wangford bypass, the A143 - Bury St Edmunds Compiegne Way and the A1120 - Cedars Link Stowmarket. The funding will also be used for better quality, long-lasting white lining on the: A146 Lowestoft, A1092, A1021, A1141, A1095 and A1120. On rural roads, when preparing roads for next summer's surface dressing, the funding will allow for work to clear drains and gullies, cut back hedges and cut grips.

## 10,000 Suffolk homes say 'no' to cold callers on their doorsteps

Suffolk Trading Standards recently gave out its 10,000th No Cold Calling sticker, just four years after launching the campaign. The stickers are placed on a homeowner's front door to declare that the resident does not want uninvited traders to call at their property. The Consumer Protection from Unfair Trading Regulations 2008, state that traders who approach a resident after having seen the sticker, are committing an offence. ## Places available for "life changing" Great East Swim programme

The Great East Swim programme is ideal for anyone who would like to become more active and is ready to make that change in their life. There are 96 places available on the 2019 programme, which starts in March and culminates on the 22 June 2019 at the Great East Swim at Alton Water reservoir near lpswich. The programme is open to individuals who are aged 18 years and over who are not currently physically active.

The programme take place at Crown Pools in Ipswich and Haverhill Leisure Centre, Haverhill, between March and June. This will be the eighth year that

the programme has been run, during which time over 370 individuals looking to make a positive change to their health and wellbeing have completed the challenge of swimming either half a mile or 1 mile in open water at the Great East Swim. Individuals who sign up for the programme will receive an extensive package of support which aims to provide them with the confidence, stamina and self-belief to complete their personal challenge and become active for life. ## Important Information: Suffolk School Travel Changes from September 2019

Suffolk County Council is implementing changes to its School Travel Policy taking effect from September 2019. We have written to all schools with information about the policy change and how it will affect them. For your reference please see below the detail of the policy change and how it may affect schools in your area.

## Statutory School Age School Travel Policy:

Children living in Suffolk who will be starting at a new school in September 2019 will be eligible for SCC funded school travel when they are over 2 miles (under 8 years old) or 3 miles (over 8) walking distance from their nearest suitable school that would have had a place available for them. This would be whether or not an application was made for a place at that school. Full details about SCC funded school travel, including additional arrangements for low income families and those with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND), can be found at www.suffolkonboard.com/schooltravel.

The new policy is being phased in. This means that children who receive Suffolk County Council (SCC) funded school travel in the 2018/2019 school year will continue to receive this whilst they continue to attend the same school unless they turn 8 years of age and live between 2 and 3 miles from their current school, or move house at which time eligibility would be reassessed.

In the first year of change to the new school travel policy this will impact on those starting or moving school with effect from September 2019. We are unable to be specific about the impact, until we complete the normal admissions rounds for September 2019. The national offer days for school places are 1 March 2019 for secondary/upper allocations and 16 April 2019 for Primary/middle allocations.

For those starting at secondary/upper schools in September 2019, parents will be informed if their child is eligible for SCC funded travel by 30 April 2019. Information about those who are eligible to

SCC funded travel will be provided to the child's receiving school. If parents do not hear from us by this date and believe their child is eligible for funded school travel, they should contact the Customer Service Team on 0345 606 6173 or email them at customer.services@suffolk.gov.uk.

For primary/middle schools for school year 2019/2020, parents will be informed by 14 May 2019 and need to contact us as soon as possible after this date if they think they might be eligible. Again, information about those who are eligible to SCC funded travel will be provided to the child's receiving school.

Beyond September 2019, changes will continue to be implemented as each year group starts a new school or a family move to a new house.

For transport in September 2019 and all future years families whose child/ren are eligible for SCC funded school travel will need to opt in to receive their transport.

This important change means that all parents will have to opt-in by 31 May each year for school travel to be provided in the following school year as this will no longer be provided automatically.

## This includes:

- Those currently eligible and who have SCC funded travel under the old policy arrangements because they will be in Year 1 to Year 6, or Year 8 to Year 11 in September 2019 (and have not moved address) or
- are eligible under the new travel policy.

Recent research has shown that some families, although eligible to SCC funded school travel, do not use their seat(s). Suffolk County Council consequently is funding seats which are unused and therefore, we are asking families to opt in.

## Post-16 Travel Policy Statement for September 2019:

The Post-16 Policy has not changed other than agreed increases to the cost of a seat until the charge equals the average cost. For September 2019/2020 school year the charge will be £750 per annum, and for students with SEND £690 per annum.

## Getting your child to school

### Walk or Bike



Walking is a great way to get to school – it's healthy, free, reduces traffic congestion at busy times and doesn't create poliution. Children may need to be accompanied by an adult, but you could talk to other parents and staff at your children's school to see if this is something adults could share or set up a "walking bus".

Cycling is another great way to get to school, but please make sure your child is seen by wearing a reflective jacket and it is recommended that they wear a helmet. Suffolk Roadsafe run Bikeability courses through school so ask your child's school about cycle training or visit www.suffolkroadsafe.com for more information.

## Park & Stride



If you need to drive, why not organise to drive part of the way only and walk the remainder to reduce congestion at your child's school gates, keeping all the children safer and improve your health and wellbeing.

### Car Share



Why not speak to other parents and organise an informal car share so that there are fewer cars at the school gates, keeping the children safer and reducing pollution. Discuss this with your child's school.

### Public Transport



Could your child catch a bus or train, perhaps? Them is a journey planner available on www.suffolkenboard.com which may help you plan your route on public transport. It may be cheaper to buy a travel pass with the operator, so always compare the fares to find the best deal. It your child is aged between 16 and 19, they can apply for an Endeavour Card which is free, accepted by the majority of bus operators and gives a minimum 25% discount on fares. The Card can also be used in the evening and at weekends. Apply for your free Endeavour Card at www.endeavourcard.co.uk

Community transport can be booked up to a week in advance and could be the solution you are looking for. It is possible to request Connecting Communities journeys online or by phone. To book a journey, head over to www.suffolkonboard.com/cc

## Draft Budget to be considered at Full Council agreed

The Council will be considering a proposed budget for 2019/20 at their meeting on 21 February. This budget includes proposals to offer discounts of up to 100% on council tax for care leavers, supporting the most vulnerable in society, while also proposing a Business Rates Relief policy for small retailers, including shops, cafes and restaurants.

The Budget also includes proposals to raise the District Council precept of Council Tax by just 2% a year for a Band D property – equivalent to only 6p a week or £3.26 pa. This allows the council to put forward a budget that proposes no cuts in front line services. You can see the full details of the budget councillors will be asked to vote on in the 'Budget Book' for 2019/20 online.

## New Parking Plan for Mid Suffolk to be Drawn Up

Mid Suffolk's Cabinet has voted to go out to public consultation on a draft Joint Area Parking Plan with Babergh District Council. The plan, which does not include any proposals to increase car parking charges, sets out eight parking policy objectives it intends to achieve. These include establishing standard on-street parking scheme operating hours, utilising off-street parking places to assist with traffic management and more.

## Councils Pay £549k to Infrastructure Projects in 2018

In the 2018 calendar year Mid Suffolk and Babergh District Councils passed £549,674.93 from developers to local infrastructure projects. This brings the total over the last three years to over £1.2 million. It has funded a variety of infrastructure projects, from sports facilities to public transport, and was collected from developers who have brought forward developments, both residential and commercial, in the districts. Mid Suffolk and Babergh's Exacom database – giving the public access to figures for developer contributions towards infrastructure all the way back to 1974 – has been nominated for the Royal Town Planning Institute's (RTPI) Awards for Planning Excellence.

The database, which is the first of its kind in the country, is in the running for an award within the Excellence in Tech Within Planning Practice category. As it is the first such database to be



published Mid Suffolk, along with Babergh, have been designated Pilot Authorities by the developer. You can find out more on our website.


