EARL STONHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



There are a few changes happening in our village, which seems to be swathed in the delightful yellow and greens of Spring at the moment.

Firstly, the sign for the Village Hall fell down as the metal posts had completely corroded. The Parish Council felt that the Village Hall has become an important and valuable asset to Earl Stonham and subsequently obtained a quote from Suffolk County Council for a replacement sign. The quote received was rather more than we had budgeted for, although it did include the installation with, of course, the mandatory traffic lights whilst it was being installed. Fortunately for us, our County Councillor, Matthew Hicks, offered to pay for the sign out of his budget and we have gratefully accepted the offer. The sign will be much easier to see because it will be of a reasonable height (the last one being a suitable height for dogs, cats, hares and foxes!).

Secondly, many of the posts on the Village Green that line the track leading to several houses were rotten. They have been replaced by new posts which also have reflectors on one side. We are very grateful to Councillor Brian Heard for taking on this task and completing it so professionally.

On a more negative note the Parish Council has several times voiced concerns to the District Council about the ever-growing scrapyards that has developed at the crossroads known as The Tap. We are interested to know the position regarding planning permission and the possible safety risks but as yet we have found it very difficult to discover the facts. Hopefully, we shall receive some information soon.

We were sorry to say goodbye to one of our Parish Councillors, Stephanie Challinor, who resigned at the beginning of the year. She has been a valuable and insightful member of the Council and we wish her well for the future. It does mean that there is now a vacancy on the Parish Council and instructions for applying appear elsewhere in this magazine.

We would like to congratulate Suzie Morley, who was re-elected in the recent local elections as our District Councillor and we look forward to working with her further in the future.

There are a couple of exciting village days to look forward to this year. There is a **Village Fun Show on June 8th**, with a repeat of the produce competition that was so successful last year. In addition, there will be a **picnic on the Village Green on September 1st** for everyone to enjoy. Further details are in the booklet you will receive with this edition. We have booked glorious weather for both occasions!

Thanks, as always go to the group of volunteers, who collate, edit and distribute The Recorder. Year 15 is well underway.....

Warm and dry, cold and dry, warm and dry, cold still dry, colder and finally wet but still cool. That pretty much sums up the start of 2019 I think you will agree. I have never seen Dad have to water his vegetable patch in April just to be able to sow some seeds in the ground before!

Thankfully the cold easterly wind disappeared just in time for the Easter weekend which was the start of a manic week for us. As quickly as I could put the plants out for sale then the customers were snapping them up.

We have about 30 new varieties this year, I went a bit mad when the new plant catalogues came out last Autumn! Some of the new plants include Heliopsis, Sanguisorba, Centaurea, Cirsium, Astrantia, Echinops, Paeonies and Salvias.

We also have a larger selection of **Climbers** which have been selling very well, looks like I shall have to stock up again soon.

Other plants which we will be selling this year include, amazing **Aquilegias**, carefree **Campanulas**, delightful **Delphiniums**, everlasting **Echinacea**, ground-covering **Geraniums**, grand **Grasses**, heavenly **Heleniums**, irresistible **Iris**, lovely **Lupins**, pretty **Peonies**, funky **Phlox**, super **Salvias** and vertical **Verbena**.

Our compost sold very well last year and the prices are the same again.

FOOTPATH ANNUAL REPORT

The past year has seen a good amount of repair and renewing of bridges and finger posts. The latter showing their age, the wooden posts rotting at the base making re-erection impossible by a Footpath committee member. We therefore have to wait our turn for a new one to be supplied and fitted by Highways. We also have two stiles that give us cause for concern on the Blue Route from the A1120 and onto the A140 from the field.

It was brought to the Parish Councils attention at the November meeting that the Finger Post on Blacksmith's Lane was pointing in the wrong direction. Councillor Woods reported in the Recorder the reasons for the change. In these days of transparency, we have to get these matters addressed. We know it is hard to understand why we now have to walk across a field of crops when most of us have been walking around the edge of the field for as long as we can remember.

The two village walks led by Tony Stevens have continued to be well attended and amazingly both been blessed with good weather.

Spring always brings the problem of fast growing vegetation, nettles and brambles being the worst. If you have a problem gaining access to any of our footpaths please get in touch with any parish councillor and we shall do our best to clear the way.

Thank you to Lindsey Stone for always having the kettle on at the end of the walk when we can rest our feet but continue our conversations.

County Councillor's Annual Report



Suffolk County Council 2019/20 budget approved

On 14 February 2019, Suffolk County Council concluded its budget setting process for this coming financial year (2019/2020). From 1 April 2019 to 31 March 2020, Suffolk County Council will spend almost £10 million a week across all its services following approval of this budget of £519.3 million.

Over the period 2011-12 to 2018-19 the Council has made over £260 million of savings in response to reductions in funding from Central Government and increasing demand for services. For 2019/20 the Council has proposed a range of savings totalling around £13 million. These savings are required to help balance the budget - something that the Council must do by law. Recognising the unrelenting rise in demand and the complexity of support required by vulnerable children and adults in Suffolk, the Council are significantly increasing spending in these two top priority areas. The net budget for Adult and Community Services (ACS) will rise to £243m and the net budget for Health, Wellbeing and Children's Services (HWCS) will rise to £147m. This is an increase of just over £14 million for ACS and HWCS. ACS and HWCS will account for 75% of the total spend in 2019/2020 – three in every four pounds the Council spends. General council tax will rise by 2.99% this year. The Council are also applying the final 1% of the six per cent Social Care precept allowed over the years 2017/18 to 2019/20. The overall increase in council tax is one per cent less than for 2018/19.

The four-year investment in surface-dressing our roads continues into its third year and the Council will treat 1,000 miles of Suffolk's roads by the end of 2020 as promised. The Council has also maintained Suffolk Fire and Rescue's budget and protected Suffolk's Library services. The Council is looking to maximise the financial contribution from its medium-term programmes, which focus on transforming how the Council delivers its services and works with other authorities and public sector partners. The Council's transformation programmes have saved over £12 million in 2018/19 and £12-£13 million of savings are planned for 2019/20.

Plan for £6million upgrades to Suffolk recycling centres

On 24 July 2018, Suffolk County Council's Cabinet approved a plan to invest £6million into upgrading Suffolk's recycling centres. The plan has earmarked £3m for the Foxhall Recycling Centre – Suffolk's busiest with 20% of all recycling waste in the county – and £1m for Haverhill for "urgent improvements". The plans will see improvements to traffic access at Foxhall and measures to prevent people from having to climb steps to dispose of their waste in the containers. Existing planning permission for work expires in March 2021. Currently at Haverhill the site has to be closed when containers are emptied because of space. The

funding aims to double the size of the site and prevent such closures. Elsewhere, £1m has been earmarked for a site to replace the Portman's Walk Recycling Centre in Ipswich town centre, and a further million for the same in Stowmarket. The existing Ipswich and Stowmarket sites are considered to be severely constrained for space, with no expansion opportunities available and the surrounding roads not offering a safe area to queue onto the facility. Construction for improvements is expected to get underway in 2019/20.

The Hold construction is underway

By November 2018, the construction of The Hold building was well underway. The Hold will deliver a new home for the majority of Suffolk's unique archival collections, as well as state-of-the-art public facilities including seminar rooms and a 200-seat auditorium. The new building, which will be situated near the junction of Fore Street and Grimwade Street in Ipswich, will be part of the University of Suffolk campus and will be run by the county and the university together. Work began on the construction of The Hold building in August 2018, with the demolition of a derelict building at the northern end of the site. The construction will focus on the strong rooms first, where the archives will be kept. The building will formally open to the public in Spring 2020. Once finished, more than 100 direct and indirect full-time jobs will be created as well as training and apprenticeships.

County Council announces timescale to progress the Ipswich Northern Route project

On 27 February, the timescale to progress the Ipswich Northern Route project was announced. Cllr Hicks outlined the next steps in producing the Strategic Outline Business Case, which will examine and ultimately clarify the feasibility of an Ipswich northern route. Discussions about an Ipswich northern route have been well documented over the years. This announcement confirms the County Council's commitment to explore these formally with a public consultation which will inform the Strategic Outline Business Case to be put to government and published later in the year. The timescale for moving the project forward is: The stage one study and report into possible highways options was completed in 2017. The options assessment and development commissioned in May 2018 is currently being evaluated and prepared for shortlisting, prior to consultation.

Public consultation on the route details, alignment options and junction options with the A14 and A12 will begin in the Summer 2019. Completion of the Strategic Outline Business Case to be shared with government, local MPs and the public by Autumn 2019. The options assessment, that forms a key part of the Strategic Outline Business Case, is required to look at all other viable transport and traffic mitigation options. This will confirm whether the road alignments published in 2017 are indeed the best solution for the county. After carefully considering the assessment and developing these options further, the next stage is public consultation to begin in summer 2019. The initial study, options assessment and the results of the public consultation inform the Strategic Outline Business Case, which will provide clarity on the feasibility of the project and will determine whether the project can proceed to the next stage. That will be shared publicly for consideration in the Autumn of 2019. Suffolk County Council has been working with District and Borough Councils to develop the project and will continue to do so in the future.

Suffolk's tourist trade booming

Suffolk's tourism trade has seen its biggest boom for a decade, with the visitor economy reaching the £2 billion mark for the first time. Interim figures released on 8 August 2018 by Visit Suffolk showed that tourism grew by at least five per cent in 2017, more than double the year before.

Overnight visits and lengths of stay for tourists were also up by more than 4 per cent. Figures show visitors now spend more money on each trip to the county than ever before, with the value of the day market up more than seven per cent. The number of jobs in the county's tourism sector rose by 6 per cent to 42,428. This means 13.6 per cent of all employment in Suffolk is in the tourism sector.

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DR DAN POULTER MP

Member of Parliament for Central Suffolk and North Ipswich

In recent months, the challenges facing the Norfolk and Suffolk Mental Health Trust have been well publicised. Mental health services in our area need to improve; patients and their families deserve no less.

Since the Trust was put into crisis measures (Special Measures), I have worked to ensure that health bosses are held to account and improvements made quickly and effectively.

As a practising NHS mental-health doctor, I am uniquely placed to be a critical friend of the Trust as it makes these changes, attending regular meetings with ministers and Clinical Commissioning Groups (the people with the money that funds health services) in Norfolk and Suffolk, as well as with the Trust itself.

Things do appear to be (slowly) improving. It is encouraging to see the new leadership at the Trust, with new Chair, Marie Gabriel, and Chief Executive, Professor Jonathan Warren, joining from the East London Trust, one of the most successful in the country. Their expertise will be invaluable.

There will also be more funding, with an extra £5.7m for psychological (talking) therapies, long-term mental health conditions like schizophrenia, crisis resolution and early intervention. The Trust is also working with local charities to improve resources relating to suicide prevention and dementia. This represents a 6.3% increase in mental health investment locally, far exceeding the national Mental Health Investment Standard. I am optimistic that these changes will help deliver substantially-improved care for patients in Suffolk.

There has been a lot of talk about restructuring: for me, this is unwanted and irrelevant. What matters is the quality of the services. I fear that splitting the Trust into three smaller units could create more problems than it solves, as the focus would be on restructuring rather than on improving the care and support for patients. I hope that our local health leaders agree.

From my medical perspective, I understand that mental health is one of the biggest challenges facing Norfolk and Suffolk. There is much to do, but I am confident that the Trust can and will be turned around.

I am pleased to be playing my part, holding ministers to account and providing a voice for those suffering from mental health issues locally. As a practising NHS doctor in the mental health field, I am in the unique position to be able to stand up for the needs of mental-health patients in Suffolk, and I shall continue to do so.

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EARL STONHAM VILLAGE HALL ANNUAL REPORT



Another busy year at the hall with increased usage including regular pub, quiz and computer club evenings organised by the hall committee.

We had hoped to progress the main hall refurbishment this year but the planned costs have increased substantially and means that even assuming we can get the grants we expect, we are still left with a £5k - £10k shortfall, hence the continued fund raising activity to close the gap. Hopefully a start will be possible during the coming year with the work carried out in stages, to keep the hall available for use as much as possible.

On a brighter note, quite a few things have been improved over the last year including the addition of a substantial storage shed at the back of the hall that will enable lesser used items to be stored as well as some of the chairs, so making more room in the main hall. As part of this work, the emergency exit route from the back corridor has been improved and the one adjacent to the stage will soon be completed. Other improvement areas have included the purchase of new lighter weight tables for the main hall and the CCTV system has been upgraded to improve hall security.

Regular pub evenings have continued with a different theme for the food each month. Quiz evenings have gone from strength to strength resulting in them out-growing the space in the club room and are now held in the main hall. Thanks to David Wicks and Norman Davis for sharing the role of quizmaster.

Whilst on the subject of events, in February we hosted 'Chocks Away' playing music from the 40s to the 60s and with demonstration dancers to show everyone the steps. This was very successful with nearly everyone there, up on the dance floor at one point!

The Computer Club still holds regular meetings and provides a learning environment for new computer users together with expert advice and assistance with any computer problems. Help is on hand for Windows,

Apple and Android platforms, as well as on more general topics like computer backups, security etc.

Bookings have continued to be very buoyant with usage increasing year on year with a number of long term regular bookings. Unfortunately, costs have also increased and we have therefore reluctantly made a small increase in rental charges this year.

Upcoming Events

On 25 May, David Wicks is hosting another Wine Tasting evening at the hall, complete with a 3 course meal. Tickets for this event are sold out already!

This year we are resting the full Hullabaloo fun day in favour of a larger **Village Show**. This will be held on **8 June** with entries to be at the hall by 12:00 and the exhibits open to the public for 'crowd' judging from 1pm. There will be a BBQ, teas and coffees and a bar so please come along and support the show.

We are very lucky as a village to have a superb Village Green, but it rarely gets used for anything other than dog-walking. So this year, on **Sunday 1 September**, we are staging a **Village Green Picnic**. Just come along at 1pm with your own picnic and chairs and be entertained by the Stonham Theatre Guild who will be staging 'A Mayhem of Musicals'.

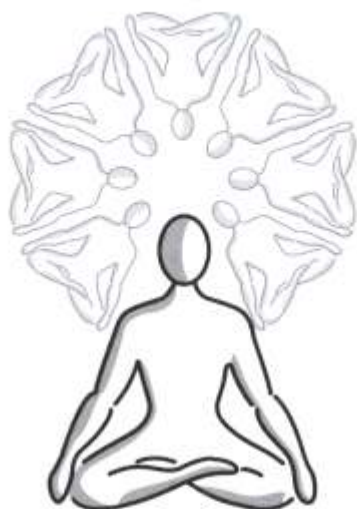

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EARL STONHAM TRUST ANNUAL REPORT



In the year 2017/18 the Trust's expenditure was significantly down on 2016/7 and shows a surplus carried forward for potential future requirements. This was mainly due to the reduced need to spend money on 1 Guildhall Cottage, plus a reduction in overall Grant expenditure. Income was only slightly up on the previous year due to small increases in investment returns and rental income.

The Trust gave Grants for the Village Hall refurbishment, Cricket Club and the Parish Council (Jubilee Bench). The Grants for Education and Needy Parishioners was very much in line with 2016/17. The Trustees continue to seek worthy applications for Grants relating to the conditions of the Constitution.

In accordance with previous practice, the Trustees considered the report from professional Playground Inspectors organised by MSDC on the safety of the Recreation Ground Play Equipment; all their recommendations were of a low priority. Pigeon spikes have been fitted to the swing top beams to prevent bird mess on the swing seats.

The Trust purchased a new, weather proof seat for the recreation ground to replace the old, rotten wooden one.

The permanent endowment of the Trust consists of the Recreation ground, the cottage and investments. The Trustees have continued to retain their investments through collective investment schemes. As at 30 September 2018, these investments continued to show a healthy increase over their original purchase price (more than double). As mentioned above, they are mindful of the fact that the Cottage is an old building that needs constant maintenance and expenditure.

The Trust has recently made grants for computer equipment, music lessons and school trips and if any resident of Earl Stonham would like help or is aware of anyone who could benefit with help with an educational expense or specific financial need, do contact in one of the following ways. Enquiries and grant applications can be made via any Trustee or download a form from the Village website to send to Jennie at jfrgriffiths@yahoo.co.uk or

post to Cornfields, Wicks Lane, IP14 5HL. Grants are considered in confidence and the next meeting is **Thursday June 20**. In addition, the Trustees, from their knowledge of the inhabitants of Earl Stonham, try to identify other potential beneficiaries.

In addition to the Recreation Ground, the Trust also owns Grade II listed 1 Guildhall Cottage and is responsible for the upkeep of both. The Recreation ground is kept in good order by the efforts of the Cricket Club for which the Trust is grateful.

In accordance with insurance requirements, the play equipment on the Recreation Ground is inspected weekly by volunteers. In the meantime, if anyone spots any concerns, please contact a Trustee.

EARL STONHAM OVER 60'S (The Golden Circle)

The speaker at our March meeting was Malcolm Taylor who spoke about the work of the charity - Hearing Dogs for Deaf People. Hearing dogs are trained to respond to important sounds and danger signals such as the doorbell, alarm clock and smoke alarm. The dogs give confidence to deaf people, particularly children who are sometimes too frightened to sleep alone. With the aid of slides and several short videos it was an inspiring and, at times emotional talk.

In April our speaker Michael Wabe dressed as Brother Michael, a fighting monk in the year 1175. He described life in medieval England at the time of feudalism. We were shown some of the pottery used in those days and also weapons of the time when he was telling us the story of 1066 and all that.

In May, for our first outing of the year we visited the RAF Air Defence Radar Museum at Neatishead. The museum consists of over 20 exhibition rooms describing the history of air defence and the development of Radar plus presentations which told the story of how Radar helped win the Battle of Britain and defended the skies during the Cold War.
