EARL STONHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



I write this at the beginning of November, yet it doesn't seem 5 minutes since the crops were being harvested and the fields ploughed. Already the green shoots of next year's crop are appearing across the parish, heralding the Spring and Summer to come – just a small matter of the Autumn and Winter to go before we get to that. There is something to be said for living in a country with varied seasons and the change

that each brings, although some can be more welcome than others, especially when we experience all four seasons in a single day! We have been fortunate not to experience the recent extremes of weather that some parts of the country have experienced in recent weeks, which makes the discussions at COP 26 in Glasgow all the more relevant.

In the Autumn edition of the Recorder, we advertised for applications for two people to be co-opted on to the Parish Council. We received 3 applications and I am pleased say that Sally Baker and Andy Stevens were voted on to the Parish Council at our meeting held on Monday 1 November. A warm welcome therefore to our new Councillors.

Parish councils are responsible for managing their own budgets. They are financed through the precept, an amount of money calculated as an estimate for the coming financial year and collected as part of your Council Tax. This money is used to improve facilities and services for local people. Parish councils can also apply for other funding, such as grants and awards. Parish councils actively welcome input from residents on what the community needs, so that they can budget for that activity. Parish Councils have a range of powers and duties that are specified in law but perhaps the most common subjects we deal with, are matters relating to planning, recreation, crime prevention and roads and highways.

With that in mind we are keen to seek your views on streetlights in the village. There are seven streetlights in the village which are paid for out of the Parish Council precept and we want to know how much these are valued.

The running costs for each light is about £75 for energy and maintenance, equating to nearly 10% of our budget. Given the recent rises in energy prices the running costs are likely to increase in 2022. Suffolk County Council have started work on a programme to replace 43,400 street lighting lanterns with LED lanterns, with the aim of reducing energy, minimising light pollution and bringing down ongoing maintenance costs. We can join in with this programme at a cost of about £700 per light. We have developed a short survey which is being distributed with this edition of the Recorder and would encourage you to fill this in and return it by one of the means set out in the survey, which will also be available for download from the web site earlstonham.org.uk

In the last edition we asked for expressions of interest in establishing a local Community Speed Watch. We only received one expression of interest and as a minimum of 6 people would be needed to establish the team, this cannot be taken forward at the present time.

Activities at the Village Hall have restarted and details of all forthcoming events can be found on the What's On page of the website. I thought it worth highlighting a few of those that are taking place up to Christmas:

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FROM YOUR LOCAL RECORDER

Many of you will remember Bob Haggar, our village blacksmith who worked until the age of 93. Far fewer will have known him in his younger days, pictured here with his employer, Gilbert Runeckles. Bob's extraordinarily long service to the community is commemorated in the name of the road opposite the forge, Haggar's Mead.



Is he the only person to have a road in the village named after him? Actually, no. Weylands Close is named after a local farmer and Larter's Lane takes its name from Charles Larter, who kept a shop there in the early 20th Century. Now I'd like to think about some of the names of houses in the village:

In the 19th Century tree names were popular and quite a few of our local houses still bear witness to this fashion - Mulberry Tree Farm, The Limes, Yew Tree House, The Chestnuts (now called Piper's Hall), Ashtree Cottage, Elm Tree Farm and The Bays. Others were named after former owners or occupiers - Welhams, Weylands, Larters, Hines Farm and Venns. Then there is College Farm, so called because it was owned as an investment by Pembroke College, Cambridge.

Others are named after their appearance or a nearby feature - Moat Farm, Red House Farm, White House Farm (there are two of these!), Rookery Farm, Mill Farm.

Then there's Bishop's Cottage. The origin of this name is unclear, but my guess is that it's named after a previous occupant, who probably did not enjoy high ecclesiastical office.

An interesting oddity is Mollands Hall. For many years it was a beerhouse and after being delicensed kept its name of The Cricketers. Early in the 19th Century, however, it was known as Waterloo House, presumably commemorating the great battle in 1815. I wonder whether the house had a name previously or, like most house at that time, it just took its owner's name.

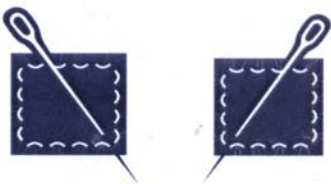

My energy supplier recently went under and the new tariff I've been put on is far more than I used to pay. I've heard energy prices are set to rise further and I'm just not sure I can afford it. What help can I get or small changes can I make around my house to help save some money this winter?

The cost of energy is very high at the moment and it's causing many people to worry. Normally we would suggest switching to a better deal, but the situation is very difficult at the moment and there aren't a lot of good deals out there. However, there are still other small ways you can keep your bills down.

Little everyday things can help, such as making sure televisions and other electronic devices are switched off and not left on standby; washing clothes on a lower temperature; and only filling the kettle with the water you need.

Turning down your main thermostat by 1 degree can save you around £60 on your energy bill. And by spending one minute less in the shower each day, a family of four could save £75 a year on energy and water bills.

You're right in another way about bills going through the roof - and the walls. One way of cutting costs in the long-run is to invest in good insulation if you can afford to. If you're renting, ask your landlord to do this.

You may be able to get financial support to help insulate your home under the Energy Company Obligation scheme. Contact your energy supplier for more information on this. If you're in a household that's not connected to the gas grid you may also be able to receive help under the Home Upgrade Grant scheme through your local authority.

There's some financial support available for paying your energy bills, depending on your situation. For example, if you're a pensioner with a low income or receive Universal Credit or other means-tested benefits, you may be entitled to the Warm Home Discount. This gives you £140 a year to go towards your bills.

If it gets too much

If you are starting to fall behind on your energy bills, then Citizens Advice can help. Our Advisers can look at your budget to see if we can help you save money and check that you're claiming everything that you're entitled to, including Warm Home Discount.

We are incredibly lucky to live in a rural county like Suffolk, largely protected from overdevelopment, but one of the biggest issues that people ask me about is the planning system. Whilst we all accept that we need to build more homes for local people and for our children and grandchildren, it is essential that any new homes are built in the right place and with the right infrastructure.

It is for these reasons that I helped to lead the successful campaign to stop the Ipswich Northern Bypass. Right from the start, it always seemed to me that the bypass was more about mass house building than about relieving any travel and congestion issues in Ipswich, and that is why so many people, like me, fought against it.

Any new housing should, in general, be on a small scale and incremental. The planning system needs to protect our precious countryside wherever possible and retain the fabric, character and heritage of our villages and towns. I have made it clear to Government ministers that any decisions around new homes and where they should be located, is a matter which must be decided locally, in full consultation with residents, parish and local councils. New homes should be delivered through a locally led planning system. Communities should retain the right to shape the areas in which they live and to be able to demand health and educational infrastructure to support any new housing.

So, I am pleased to report that working alongside a number of other MPs, I have succeeded in delivering a rethink on the recent Government Planning White Paper. The White Paper would have set national targets for house building, made it much easier for developers to build houses and would have circumvented the local planning process. For me, this would have been wrong. It is essential that planning rules are set locally, not according to national targets, and I am pleased to have played my part in ensuring that this will continue to be the case.

Later this year, the Government will firmly set out new planning laws in its Planning Bill and I am confident that these laws will deliver a planning system that is locally led and fit for the future. With COP26 upon us, it is essential that due consideration is also given to the environment and I would also like to see a planning system that delivers high quality, low carbon design, helping to ensure cost effective, energy efficient homes, so that we continue to play our world-leading role in tackling climate change.

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Showcasing Suffolk's environmental achievements as the UK hosts COP26

On September 8th Suffolk County Council launched Creating the Greenest County Awards 2021. Creating the Greenest County is now more important and more relevant than ever - going green, reducing carbon and protecting biodiversity are choices we must all be making. The United Nations COP26 event in November will rightly focus on the international agreements that need to be in place, and the 2021 Creating the Greenest County Awards will bring this huge issue into a Suffolk focus and give us encouragement and inspiration to make changes to how we live our lives and secure a better future. As Suffolk works hard towards its net zero carbon 2030 target, the Awards provide an excellent opportunity for individuals, businesses, communities, schools and voluntary organisations to be celebrated for the environmental work they do to combat climate change, or simply for improving the area where they live. Nominations for the Creating the Greenest County Awards are now open and nominations can be submitted online at greensuffolk.org/awards.

This year's categories will include biodiversity and landscape, business, community, schools and waste and recycling, and we will be recognising our county's green heroes. Many individuals have taken it on themselves to lead the way in making change, voluntary organisations have formed to help transform their local communities and businesses are taking their environmental responsibilities even more seriously. Since its inception in 2007, Creating the Greenest County has seen Solar PV generation becoming mainstream without government subsidy, the world's largest wind farm operating from our coast and virtually no waste going to landfill. 500 businesses have been accredited and over 900 supported to develop carbon reduction plans and the county is embracing the move towards electric vehicles. We can see the reality of climate change across the globe on a daily basis but are proud that the majority of organisations involved in Creating the Greenest County have declared a Climate Emergency and made a strong commitment to achieving net zero emissions. The Suffolk Climate Emergency Plan sets out the collaboration required to achieve our aspirations and the Awards recognise those that have gone above and

beyond to support this. We have launched this year's awards at E J Barker and Sons at Lodge Farm, who won the Biodiversity and Landscape award in 2019 and are sharing their best practice at COP26 this year. The Awards are a chance to celebrate the people, organisations and communities that are making Suffolk the Greenest County. This is a great opportunity to shine a light on anyone who inspires others to make Suffolk a better place for its residents and its wildlife. It could be someone who has inspired you to live more sustainably, or an organisation which has transformed its business operations to be carbon neutral. Work begins to replace street lights in Suffolk and save energy in the County

On September 13th, Suffolk County Council and Bouygues Energies & Services (Bouygues E&S) have started work replacing 43,400 street lighting lanterns in Suffolk with LED lanterns. SCC and Bouygues E&S joined forces to create a flagship partnership with the aim of reducing energy, minimising light pollution, bringing down ongoing maintenance costs for the Authority and providing the best value to residents. SCC expects to reduce its annual electricity costs on these assets by around 76 percent, saving more than 1.7 million pounds a year. The upgrade of the lighting system will include a further rollout of SCC's central management system which will allow lights to be switched on or off and dim individual or groups of lights. This smart technology will increase the control the Authority has over its power consumption which will further reduce costs. The system will also automatically flag any lights that are not working which reduces the need for night-time inspections. The Street Lighting LED Upgrade contract commenced in May 2021 and the scope of works includes:

Survey

Design to latest British and European Standards

Supply and installation of new LED Street Lighting with wireless control system

Removal of existing luminaires

Updating inventory

Verification

All roles are being advertised locally to Suffolk and social value activities undertaken throughout the period of the contract will include volunteering days, tree planting and presentations to local school children.

After a successful mobilisation period, where local people from within Suffolk make up the majority of our new team, we are excited about starting this large-

scale LED street lighting upgrade and being a pivotal partner for the Authority in reducing its carbon emissions. To follow the project updates please visit via Suffolk Highways twitter: [@Suff_highways](#)."

Independent review highlights failings in some of Suffolk's SEND services

An independent report into parts of Suffolk's special educational needs (SEND) provision was published on September 20th. This report has been written by a team from Lincolnshire, including Lincolnshire County Council and parent carer network. The review looked at processes, communication protocols and family-facing elements of SEND provision and was commissioned by Suffolk County Council in June. The report lists strengths and weaknesses of the service and includes nine recommendations for improvement. These recommendations are now being worked through and implemented by Suffolk County Council and other partners who help deliver SEND services. The review has found that we must change what we are doing in a number of areas. I would like to say sorry to any child or young person, and their families, who we may have failed. Our priority now is to implement these recommendations with pace, efficiency and impact. We have begun to make these changes, but it will take time before the impact of the changes are felt. We are grateful to the team at Lincolnshire for their findings and recommendations, which we accept wholeheartedly, and for their support and advice. Suffolk County Council commissioned this review after the May elections because of concerns that our SEND services were not performing well. As we anticipated, the report has shown that SEND services in Suffolk are not good enough, and I want to apologise to those children and young people we have let down. I want to be clear that this report does not cover all SEND services and many children or young people who have specialist educational needs in Suffolk are very well served, but significant changes must be made following this hard-hitting report.

We must learn from this report and implement fundamental change as quickly as we can. The review was commissioned following a significant increase in correspondence from parents and carers earlier this year. An Action Plan based on the recommendations is now being implemented. One of the recommendations made in the review was to work with a third-party organisation to deliver improvements. The council has since secured Impower as a strategic partner, who will bring capacity and extensive experience of working on SEND systems across the country. Other recommendations include staff training, reviewing the process for allocating specialist placements and working with education leaders and parents and carers to understand the

demand for specialist provision and use data and local intelligence to inform sufficient planning.

New Suffolk Recycling Centres online booking system improvements

On September 20th it was announced that Suffolk County Council has developed a new, more user-friendly booking system which enables residents to book slots for recycling. For bookings from 27 September, people can view all available time slots in real time, to see which booking slots are free at any given moment. The system allows you to book up to seven days in advance. If circumstances change, you can easily cancel your slot up to one hour beforehand or equally, you can click to amend your booking if required. The system is also able to advise customers on which sites accept specific materials, such as plasterboard to ensure the correct type of booking is made to save customers' time, and it can also be used to share real time messages with customers, for example if any site needs to close due to adverse weather or emergency situations. The new booking system is connected to automated numberplate recognition to allow for a trial of automatic entry gates.

Customer survey results show overwhelming support for the use of a booking system and the Council has gathered feedback from customers and site staff on how the booking system can be further improved, which have shaped the design of this new system. Through the use of bookings the council can avoid the frustration of long queues at peak times and increase the overall throughput and efficiency of the service for residents. During the last 16 months through the pandemic, it was important that we managed access to Suffolk's Recycling Centres in a safe and organised fashion to ensure the safety of residents visiting to recycle their waste as well as that of our staff and contractors working on site. I am very pleased that sites are now back to full capacity and the new booking system will allow us to make adjustments to the system to make best use of all available slots at every site. The system has been developed with our customers in mind, with staff taking on board the views and comments received through regular customer feedback and interactions over the past year. Our site teams have done a great job in maintaining high levels of customer service during such difficult circumstances and as we begin to recover from Covid as a county. Illegal cigarettes seized in Trading Standards crackdown

It was announced on September 17th that thousands of illegal cigarettes had been seized from shops in Lowestoft and Beccles as part of a Trading Standards crackdown. More than 12,000 cigarettes were sniffed out by tobacco detection dogs at three shops in the town, with over 8000 of the cigarettes and 8kg of hand rolled tobacco found under a manhole cover in the rear of one the premises. The operation was supported by Suffolk Police, Norfolk Trading Standards and Wagtail UK. A total of 12,440 cigarettes and 18.45kg of hand rolled tobacco were seized from the stores. All the items are suspected to be illegally imported into the UK without duty being paid and do not comply with the legal packaging and labelling requirements. Several of them are also suspected to be counterfeits of popular brands, which are likely to contain harmful substances and may not self-extinguish - presenting increased health and safety risks. The seized products will now be fully assessed as part of the investigation to determine the exact offences that have been committed. Test purchases had been carried out before the raids with all three selling to covert officers. Intelligence was received that the premises were selling illegal tobacco. Test purchases and a thorough search of the premises and grounds by the team led to the discovery of the tobacco products. Far from being a victimless crime, illegal tobacco trading creates a cheap source for children and young people, undermines the reduction of smoking, and affects the trade of legitimate retailers. We strongly encourage members of the public to recognise the adverse health, economic and social impacts of the illicit trade of tobacco products. The sale of illegal tobacco is also linked to organised crime which results in dealers going to extreme lengths and using very sophisticated methods to hide the tobacco products from trading standards.

People are urged to look for:

Packaging that is not plain olive green

A lack of health warnings

Text on the packet that is not in English

Cheap prices

Unknown brands

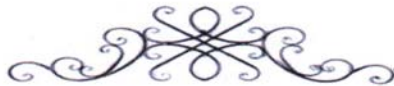
