EARL STONHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



Welcome to the Summer edition of the Recorder, which again appears in both print and online versions. I am pleased to present my annual report for 2022/23 which will have been presented at the Annual Parish Meeting on 15 May. All the papers for the Annual Parish Meeting can be viewed on the Village Website.

At the recent local elections 7 Councillors stood for reelection and, as there were no other candidates the election was uncontested. 2 Councillors, Henry Glasse and Andy Stevens decided that it was time for them to stand down. I should like to pass on my, and those of the Parish Council's, thanks to them for their contribution as councillors.

Earl Stonham Parish Council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people who live in the parish. It is the level of local government closest to the community, with Mid-Suffolk District Council and Suffolk County Council above it in the hierarchy.

On their own, parish councils have limited powers to make decisions, but we do have the ability to negotiate with, and the power to influence other organisations that do make the final decisions. Probably the most common topics that we get involved with in Earl Stonham are planning matters (we are statutory consultees), crime prevention, roads and highways.

In the year since May 2023, the Parish Council has:

- Held 8 meetings.
- Considered 29 Planning Applications and submitted views to Mid Suffolk District Council as part of the planning process.
- The Village web site, maintained by the Parish Council, has received 1,675 page views in the last 12 months (slightly lower than 2021/22), with the Village Hall, Parish Council, St Mary's Church and the Recorder pages receiving the most visits. Almost 80% of those visits come from the UK, but almost 17% from the USA and 2% from

- China. 53% of visitors are using desktop browsers to access the site, with the rest via a tablet or other mobile device (figures which are broadly similar to 2021/22).
- Following on from last year's Street Light consultation, replacement LED Lamps have been fitted to 2 of the lights. We have secured funding from Cllr Hicks and Cllr Morley to upgrade the remaining 5 lights during 2023.
- Speeding continues to be a significant concern to residents. In 2022 the Safety Camera Team detected a total of 321 speeding offences.
- The Community Speed Watch Team began operating in the summer of 2022. In 2022 the team recorded 231 cases of speeding which were reported to Suffolk Police. So far in 2023, 54 motorists have been reported.
- Following the traffic survey we have held discussions with a Highways Engineer to explore options in relation to speed signage and white lining and other mitigations, further discussions are to take place following the local elections, including the identification of funds to support any works.

In the coming weeks and months there will be two significant consultations taking place

- 1. National Grid are continuing with their proposals to reinforce the high-voltage electricity network from Norwich Main substation via Bramford substation to Tilbury substation in Essex. The preferred route corridor passes to the west of the Parish, along Saxham Street and running South between Stowupland, Stowmarket and Needham Market. There is significant opposition to the use of pylons. Essex, Suffolk and Norfolk Pylons Group are leading protests against the current proposals and lobbying Government, supported by local MPs across East Anglia to reopen discussion about a sub-sea route rather than pylons. We continue to receive updates about this.
- 2. In recent weeks we have been contacted by a company called Low Carbon who are proposing to develop a new solar farm to be known as Willow Solar Farm on agricultural land adjacent to Blacksmiths Lane. Details of a Webinar and Village Hall Drop-In event have been circulated previously. The proposal will be subject to a planning application in due course.

The Coronation of King Charles III took place on 6 May. Locally a King's Coronation Celebration Supper was held on Friday 5 May followed by the

Coronation Big Lunch on Sunday 7 May. Dawn and I were away for the weekend but I believe it was fantastic weekend and both events were well attended with 68 attending the supper and more than 100 for the Big Lunch. Thanks go out to all those who helped over the weekend to make it such a success. More photos of the events can be found on the village website in the Galleries section.











You may have noticed that the Village sign has been restored and is back in its rightful place on the Village Green. My thanks to Tony Turner and Brian Heard for their work in repairing and restoring the sign, and to Di Brenig-Jones for her brilliant painting skills. Although it now looks

wonderful, I do think that the sign is nearing the end of its life and we are going to have to consider replacing it within a few years. If anyone knows of anyone with the skills to create a new sign, please let us know.

I must pay tribute to all those people in the village who give freely of their time and efforts for the benefit of the wider community in Earl Stonham. Whether it is the organising of the events and activities that take place at the village hall, the annual pantomime, the organising of events to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III, or those regular activities such as the production and distribution of the Recorder; none of these would be possible without the input of those individuals – my sincere thanks for all your hard work.



As many of our children and grandchildren enter the summer exam term, it provides an opportunity to reflect upon what skills and qualifications are now needed for young people entering the world of work.

The Prime Minister recently announced that in future, all children will need to study maths until age 18. Although compulsory maths until the age of 18 does not, initially, feel very attractive, I believe we can change perceptions of the subject. Applying maths skills in the real world is essential in all jobs and walks of life and offers an increase in self-confidence that will serve our children well throughout their lives.

As a regular visitor to schools across our area, I am proud of the hard work that goes into supporting our children. During a recent visit to Kesgrave High School, I was asked some excellent questions by a student around encouraging young women to take up Science, Tech, Engineering and Maths (STEM) qualifications and retaining that talent for lifelong careers in Suffolk.

It has become clear to me that our young people care deeply about achieving net zero, and I am pleased that along with sixth forms, we have a wide range of educational settings here that offer these qualifications, such as Suffolk New and Suffolk Rural. Our schools and colleges have strong relationships with local businesses and are already seeking opportunities for our young people with Sizewell C.

Suffolk's Energy Coast is internationally recognised as excellent in producing and delivering sustainable, clean energy solutions, offering great careers and underpinning economic growth here in Suffolk and across the UK. We have one of the driest climates in England with longer hours of daily sunshine and miles of coastline, so it is seen as the perfect location for solar energy and of course, offshore wind.

I have reservations about the proposals for Sizewell C, but until we can find better ways of storing the electricity produced by renewable sources, nuclear power remains an important form of electricity production. We are all striving

to be more environmentally conscious and nuclear energy has the advantage of being carbon neutral and so reduces reliance on fossil fuels.

Maths underpins achievement in all STEM subjects which are key to supporting the growth in jobs in Suffolk's energy industry. Thanks to Suffolk's leading role in the nuclear and renewables sector, our young people can play their part in building a brighter, greener future, but let's not forget that maths is useful in all walks of life. Young people will one day need to manage household budgets, understand mobile phone contracts and arrange mortgages. These skills are workplace transferable, and we must not fail our children when it comes to confidence in maths both for their own lives and in safeguarding a strong economic future for the country.

I am incredibly proud of everything we have to offer young people, here in Suffolk. I couldn't think of a better place to live and work, and I wish all our students all the very best for their exams and hopefully some outstanding results to come.



Council to protect frontline services and increase funding in budget proposal

Adult care services and children's services will receive £47m more funding as part of Suffolk County Council's £685m budget proposals. Despite an incredibly challenging economic climate, the council has been able to produce a balanced budget. This will protect the services that people

rely on the most and continue to care for the most vulnerable, which accounts for 75% of the whole budget. Adult care services will have £34m more in their budget, and children's services will have a further £13m. This will help with the extra expense needed to meet the huge increase in demands for services, as well as higher costs due to inflation. The budget-setting has been achieved with input from the council's partners, officers, departments and notably, Suffolk residents.

Over 2,600 local people contributed to an online survey and focus groups, asking where they would spend more money, spend less money, and their views on Council Tax. The top service areas where people wanted to spend more, were social care services for adults and children. Some of the service areas where people also said they wanted to see more money spent, will receive additional funding:

£700,000 for SEND services to support new recruitment, which is on top of the £1.1m invested this year

£500,000 for Highways: to use environmentally friendly weed treatments and stop using glyphosate which can damage wildlife

£110,000 for tree management: to support the 'right tree right place' policy, having an appropriate inspection regime and supporting the resulting tree management requirements.

£45,000 for Citizens Advice: to support work during cost of living challenges

A budget gap for next year - the difference between what money is available and what needs to be spent - had already been identified, resulting in savings

of £15.5m for next year. Under the proposals, the council's budget would increase by 9.6% (from £625.3m to £685.3). Additional funds would come from a total 3.99% increase in Council Tax, and an increase in funds from the Government for adult and children's social care. Regarding Council Tax, the proposed 3.99% increase would be made up of a 1.99% increase in general Council Tax and a 2.00% increase dedicated to funding adult care.

Historic half a billion pound devolution deal hands Suffolk regeneration & skills powers to level up

A landmark devolution deal, which puts money and power over building, regeneration and skills into the hands of leaders in Suffolk will be signed today. Suffolk will be devolved power over their Adult Education budget, so they can shape provision in a way that best suits the needs of the local community and will receive immediate support to build new affordable homes on brownfield sites, as well as more capital funding to improve energy efficiency in houses. The deal will also see Suffolk County Council handed control over a £480 million investment fund – this will be guaranteed for the next thirty years. This will enable the county to drive growth and plan for the long-term with certainty as it looks to level up and unlock its full economic potential. Suffolk will also get a directly elected leader of the council. This not only provides a single person who is accountable to the people of Suffolk but gives the county a local champion who can attract investment and be a stronger voice in discussions with central government. The deal also sets out the government's plans to devolve more power to Suffolk County Council through:

Investment: It will bring decades of funding worth £480 million to improve the lives of Suffolk's residents and spend on their local priorities. Housing: The deal will provide £5.8 million to regenerate brownfield land into beautiful, affordable homes and drive economic growth across the area; Suffolk will also receive greater compulsory purchase powers.

Education: The agreement devolves the Adult Education Budget so they can shape provision in a way that best suits the needs of residents and the local Suffolk economy.

Transport: An integrated transport settlement starting in 2024/25, to support the area to improve key transport infrastructure priorities.

The Environment: The new deal will help Suffolk deliver on its ambitions to be the country's greenest county with £3 million to improve energy efficiency in homes

The deal is now subject to local consultation, a council resolution to change their governance model so that electors directly elect the council leader, and elements, such as the transfer of new powers, require parliamentary approval to secondary legislation. The deal envisages the election of a directly elected leader after May 2024. Subject to the passing of the relevant measures in the Levelling Up and Regeneration Bill.

£2.5 million saved on energy costs as LED streetlight project nears completion

A project with the aim of replacing all 43,400 streetlights across Suffolk with sustainable, longer- lasting, and cost-saving LED bulbs nears completion. It has saved more than £2.5 million pounds so far. The change to LED streetlights supports Suffolk County Council's aim to reduce carbon, light pollution, and bring down ongoing maintenance costs for the council, all whilst providing the best value to residents. It was expected that the council would reduce costs by around 76%, however, the target was exceeded, with 77.64% savings made to date. In June 2021, Bouygues Energies and Services were announced as the partner to deliver the project to upgrade 43,400 Suffolk streetlights with new, reduced energy LED lanterns. The total number of upgraded streetlights is currently at 40,692 excluding any of the Ipswich Borough Council, or Town/Parish council owned streetlights.

There are approximately 1,700 upgrades outstanding, which includes any remaining heritage lantern upgrades. It is hoped that around 1200 of the remaining lanterns will be completed by the end of the year. Prior to the commencement of the project, Suffolk Highways contacted towns and parishes to provide them with the opportunity to have their parish-council owned street-lighting upgraded at the same time. All heritage-style lanterns are also being upgraded as part of the project. The upgrade of the lighting system will include a further rollout of SCC's central management system which will allow lights to be switched on or off and dim individual or groups of lights. This smart technology will increase the control the council has over its power consumption which will further reduce costs. The system will also automatically flag any lights that are not working which reduces the need for night-time inspections. The shift over to these new LED lanterns has enabled the council to save a considerable amount on energy costs and supported our organisation's ambition to become carbon-neutral organisation by 2030.I

would like to extend my congratulations and thank you to all those working on this project and ensuring its resounding success. I look forward to seeing its continued positive impact in the coming years as we reap the benefits of stronger, cheaper and more environmentally friendly streetlights.

Next round of new SEND places agreed by Cabinet

The Council's Cabinet agreed a new wave of funding to continue its programme to provide places for children and young people with SEND. The £3million agreement marks the start of Phase 3 of the Capital Programme to create three additional specialist units providing 42 additional places for students with special educational needs and disabilities. This follows Phase 1 of the programme which created 825 news places across Suffolk and Phase 2, which was signed off in June 2022, and will create up to 73 new places. So far, £45million has been allocated by Suffolk County Council to deliver the new places for Phase 1 and Phase 2 - £15million of which has been provided by the Department for Education. In addition, Cabinet also agreed to support the Department for Education's High Needs Provision Capital Funding (HNPCF) for 2023/24 of £7million to be spent on the development of units attached to mainstream schools to support students with social, emotional and mental health problems and speech, language and communication needs. This will create up to 168 new spaces, and is an addition to previous funding agreed from the Department for Education in 2022/23 for up to 78 new places. The third item signed off today was Cabinet's support for the application for funding for two free schools from the Department for Education. One of these will be in east Suffolk and support children with severe learning difficulties and the second will be built in Sudbury for those with autistic spectrum disorder and complex social, emotional and mental health problems. If the bids are successful, both schools will teach children and young people from across Suffolk. In total, Suffolk will deliver up to 1,317 new places for children and young people with SEND by 2025/26. We are seeing a continued increase in demand for specialist places for children and young people with SEND in Suffolk and it is vital we continue to stay ahead of this increased demand.

£7.8 million redevelopment of Foxhall Recycling Centre to begin

Work on a major expansion of the Foxhall Recycling Centre near Ipswich is set to begin.

RG Carter Ltd has been appointed by SCC as contractor for the £7.8 million project. The new design will increase capacity for cars on site, reduce queuing

and improve access from Foxhall Road, and provide greater capacity to meet future growth. The site will have a raised level construction, giving better access to the containers for users without the need for stairs. Containers can also be emptied without the need to close the site. The funding includes £794,414 from East Suffolk Council through the Community Infrastructure Levy collected from new housing developments in the East Suffolk area. Work is scheduled to complete in early 2024 and the site will remain open to the public during construction. The project will be conducted in phases to keep the centre operational throughout the build, but at certain times this may result in fewer booking slots being available to the public.

The Re-use shop will change location in the new layout and will need to be closed for a period early next year to allow this to take place. The project will also see the installation of a feeder lane from Foxhall Road, making access into the site safer. Of the 11 recycling centres around the county Foxhall accounts for 19% of recycling and waste, collecting more than 12,500 tonnes a year. This is a significant investment in Foxhall recycling centre that will bring benefits to its users for many years to come. Whilst the centre will remain open during work this will be a complex project which will, inevitably, result in some disruption at times, so I would ask the public to be patient while improvements are being made. Foxhall is the busiest recycling centre in the county, so once complete this really will be a flagship site for Suffolk residents.

County Councils unanimously agree "no" to damaging pylons proposal

Authorities in Essex, Norfolk and Suffolk have united to condemn the current proposals for a 180km network of 50m tall electricity pylons. The East Anglia GREEN proposal put forward by National Grid for a 180km network of electricity pylons between Norwich, Bramford and Tilbury. The councils agree that the plan for pylons is destructive and outdated, and will cause irreversible damage to the countryside, wildlife habitats and local communities. A new electricity network is needed to transmit the ambitious 50 GW of offshore wind that the Government aims to be delivered by 2030, and to connect new projects like Sizewell C. So much of this ambition falls on East Anglia, to provide energy for much of the country. The councils fully support the need to generate this renewable and low carbon electricity, to meet local and national Net Zero ambitions. However, they believe that more suitable, sustainable and modern alternatives for the network have not been properly investigated and presented, such as undersea cable routes around the coastline of East Anglia. Formalising their long-standing positions on the East Anglia GREEN proposal,

the councils join a group of 13 MPs who signed a letter criticising the consultation, along with a growing public petition .

This is located at the far corner of the car park adjacent to the old Bowls Club entrance and is a 2 socket, 7kw charger and costs **45p per kw** with any profit going to the village hall. It is available for anyone to use and can be used with a normal contactless credit/debit card or via a smartphone app.

FROM YOUR LOCAL RECORDER John Jones

Over a year ago the Stonham Magpie's sign was destroyed by an impact from a vehicle. This well-known landmark, listed Grade II, had stood over the road for very many years and is (or was) an extremely rare survivor.

The EADT reported that the owners have given the sign to Stonham Parva Parish Council, who have begun a campaign to raise the estimated £20-30,000 that will be required to restore it to its former glory.

The history of this sign is somewhat obscure and it isn't clear how long it has stood there. Being constructed of timber and exposed to the elements, it's likely that the



present structure isn't the original.

The photo, dating from the early 20th century shows a coach outing either starting from, or stopping for refreshments at, The Magpie. Many of the party are having a chat in the middle of the road, something that would be ill-advised today. A large Tollemache sign board hangs below the arch and that, too, wouldn't last long in today's traffic.

You have probably noticed the work taking place in the old bowls club area. We are still working on the final lease for the premises from the ES Trust but work has progressed in a number of areas. The main job was breaking through the hedge between the car park

and the bowls green to provide around 24 overflow parking spaces.

This proved far harder than originally expected and was greatly helped by the loan of a mini digger by Brian Rice and manual help from John Bull, Brian Heard, Henry Glasse and John Jones. Use of the Cricket Club roller and a Wacker Plate from Sally Baker at Masquerade helped complete the access. We have also seeded the wildflower area so hopefully we will have a meadow soon if the birds have left any of the seed!

One consequence of taking on the Bowls Club site is a significant increase in maintenance work – especially with the summer coming we have a lot more grass to cut! If anyone has some time to spare to help with this, it would be really appreciated.

Of course, the big news has been the recent Coronation celebrations. On the Friday before the Coronation we organised a celebration dinner for 70 with suitably decorated hall and tables. The WI organised the desserts and the Theatre Guild laid on entertainment of songs and dance.

Sunday saw a 'Bring and Share' lunch for everyone and right up to the last minute we were unsure if we could hold this outside due to the unsettled weather. In the end the weather gods were on our side and we had lovely weather and well over 100 people attending who provided a fine lunch spread.

Finally, you may have noticed that the streetlight at the entrance to the hall car park has been removed. This had reached the end of its working life and is being replaced with a more energy efficient one in the near future.

In March around 40 members and guests met in the Church of St Mary the Virgin, Earl Stonham, for a guided talk by Roy Tricker. Roy is a leading authority on Suffolk churches, he has visited 500 medieval churches. He described how the church has gone through many renovations since the 14th century when the porch was built. It was a most enjoyable talk, finishing with tea and biscuits.

For our April meeting we were back in the Village Hall. The planned speaker, Mr Hardcastle, was unable to attend, instead Pauline Birchnall stepped in to tell us about her experience as a secretary working in Iran at the time of the Islamic Revolution in 1979. Pauline described her day to day life, and how she was taken by coach and plane out of the country when all foreigners were ordered to leave Iran almost immediately. Thankfully she arrived home safe and sound.

In May, Simon Hardcastle, brother of our member Sue, came to talk to us about glass and its long history. Glass-making dates back at least 3000 to 4000 years. The techniques of glass-blowing, developed around 100 BC, are still in use today. Simon learnt the art of making stained glass into windows and other decorative pieces, many of which he brought along to show us.

We are looking forward to our visit In June to the Food Museum Stowmarket, formerly the Museum of East Anglian life, where we will be able to watch sheep-dog trials and enjoy a cream tea at the museum.

In July we celebrate the Club's birthday with an evening meal at the Park Hotel, Diss, and in August the plan is to have a barbecue lunch with games on the Village Hall green.
