## Vacancies for 2 Parish Councillors (to be co-opted)

Earl Stonham Parish Council is a local authority that makes decisions on behalf of the people who live in the parish. It is the level of local government closest to the community, with Mid-Suffolk District Council and Suffolk County Council above it in the hierarchy.

On their own, parish councils have limited powers to make decisions, but they do have the ability to negotiate with, and the power to influence other organisations that do make the final decisions. Probably the most common topics that parish councils get involved with are planning matters (we are statutory consultees), crime prevention, roads and highways.

Earl Stonham Parish Council currently has 7 Councillors, with 2 vacancies. We are now seeking expressions of interest from people who are over 18 years of age who live or work in Earl Stonham. **We are keen to have interest from individuals of all ages and backgrounds.**

## EARL STONHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



Welcome to the Winter edition of the Recorder, which is appearing in both print and online (colour) versions.

We have two vacancies for a Parish Councillor. ### Updates:

- In August, Low Carbon's application for a Solar Farm Development on land adjacent to Blacksmiths Lane was granted. As part of the grant of the application a number of conditions were attached. The scheme requires a Parish Liaison Scheme be established so that we can be kept up to date with the progress of construction and provide a line of communication with the developers. This group will involve a small number of local residents and we anticipate that this will be established during 2026. We understand the development, construction and commissioning of the Solar Farm will take up to 3 years.
- There will also be a Community Benefit Fund to be managed by the Parish Council and we will have the option of a one-off lump sum, an annual payment at a flat rate or an annual payment which will be index linked – we await further details. This will become available when the site becomes operational.
- 2 Speed Indicator Devices have been erected and are now fully operational. As well as flashing oncoming traffic with their speed, the devices record data of the speed coming towards the sign and as it departs the sign in the other direction. Initial data is encouraging. Of traffic coming towards the devices, 95.38% are travelling at below 34 mph, and as they leave 88.91% are travelling at 34 mph or less.
- National Grid has submitted its application for a Development Consent Order to the Planning Inspectorate which has decided to accept it. The Parish Council will be registering as an Interested Party so that we can participate fully in the examination of the application and attempt to minimise and mitigate any adverse impacts. We are a Statutory Consultee in the Nationally Significant Infrastructure Processes.
- We plan to launch a new website during the first quarter of 2026. This will link to the Parish Council's move to a 'gov.uk' website domain and associated email

addresses. This is a recommendation identified in our recent audit and is being encouraged by National Government.

- We commissioned a survey of all the trees surrounding the Village Green and Allotments. This has highlighted a range of works that we will need to undertake. You will have noticed that the tree adjacent to the Village Sign on the Village Green has been taped off. The central stem of this tree has partially failed and is hung up in the canopy about 5m above ground. The tree is at risk of further failure and has been recommended for removal. This work will be carried out as soon as the tree surgeons have availability. The neighbouring tree has also been recommended for removal as, once the first tree has been removed, this tree will be subject to additional wind forces which will increase stress on the tree. The removal of the second tree will be undertaken during 2026 and the Parish Council will be discussing planting new trees at the November meeting.
- We currently have three allotments at Broad Green that are available to rent. In the absence of any expressions of interests from residents within the Parish, we have contacted neighbouring Parish Councils to advise them of the availability of these allotments – we would rather see them in productive use than allow them to become overgrown. Priority will be given to residents of the Parish so if you have always wanted an allotment, please seize the opportunity and contact the Parish Clerk.

### Village Events

- On Saturday 30 August, the Stonham Theatre Guild put on their “Summer Madness” show with accompanying barbeque which was very successful and raised much needed funds for the Theatre Guild. Thanks to all who supported it.
- Christmas is fast approaching, and we have 2 dates for your diary:
  - Carols on the Green will be on **Thursday 18 December** at **19.00**, followed by refreshments provided by the WI. **Please bring spare pennies (pounds!) as there will be a collection that evening for charity.**
  - The Stonham Theatre Guild Pantomime will be ***Jack and the Beanstalk.*** This will take place in **January** on **Friday 30 and Saturday 31** with evening performances commencing at 7.00pm on both evenings and a matinee performance at 2.30pm on the Saturday afternoon. For those would be thespians there is still an opportunity to join the cast.

Don't forget to check the Village Events page on the website for details of What's On, including our regular monthly quiz nights and supper evenings.

We rely heavily on volunteer effort, without which we would not be able to run many of the events or activities that we do and there is real risk that some of our activities will not be able to continue. We have asked for volunteers to come forward previously with very limited response. I know everyone is very busy but

so are our existing volunteers who have day jobs, other volunteering activities or family commitments.

The only paid role we have is that of the Parish Clerk – everything else that happens in the Parish is only possible because someone volunteers to lead or be involved in a project or activity. If you do have a little time to spare, please consider helping and supporting one of our projects – these can be regular activities or even one-off projects such as helping with the annual clean of the Village Hall, or annual maintenance of the Church graveyard. If you think you could commit some time, please email the Parish Clerk.

Perfect Perennials has closed for 2026 whilst Karl & Darren take a very well-deserved break and we wish them all the best for their new adventures.

This just leaves me to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a happy and prosperous New Year and I hope to see you at Carols on the Green.

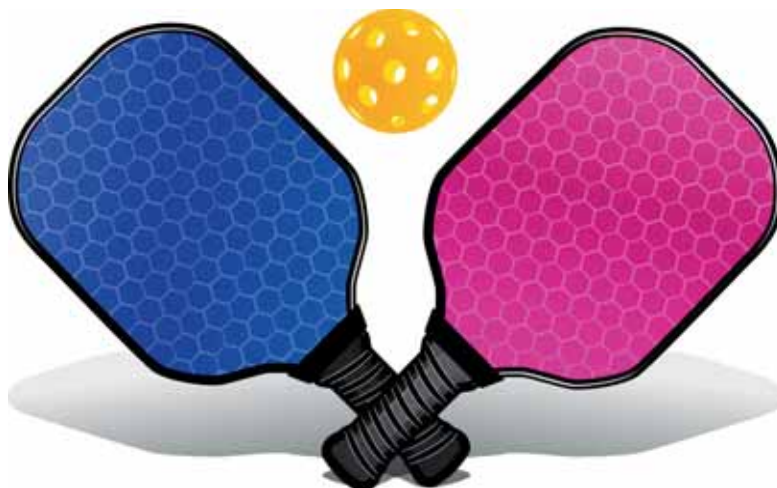
### MOBILE LIBRARY & COFFEE & CAKE FRIDAYS

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## **October 2025 report for the Thredling Division from Cllr Matthew Hicks**



### **Window now open to apply for primary and secondary school places**

The deadline for applications to secure a place at a secondary school is Friday 31 October 2025 and for primary school places, including infant and junior schools, the deadline is Thursday 15 January 2026. All applications received by the relevant closing date are processed at the same time using the schools' oversubscription criteria to prioritise applications when necessary. Late applications are processed after all of those received on time. Last year, Suffolk County Council received over 14,700 on time applications for pupils wishing to start at a primary or infant school, or to transfer to a

junior school, or into Year 7 at a secondary school from September 2025. 94% of applicants received offers for their first preference school and 98.4% of applicants received an offer for one of their top three preferred schools. Parents and carers need to carefully consider which schools to apply for on behalf of their child. They need to make sure they complete and submit their application by the closing date to give them the best chance of getting a place at one of their preferred schools. We recommend that parents and carers apply for more than one school, and they can list up to three schools on their application. I would strongly advise that parents and carers think about how their child will travel to school before they apply for a school place. It is important that parents and carers check which is their child's nearest suitable school on our Nearest School Checker because this might not be their catchment area school. This can be found at <http://nearestschool.suffolk.gov.uk/>. Parents and carers should apply online at [www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissions](http://www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissions) as they will receive confirmation that their application has been received. If for any reason they are unable to apply online they should apply on a paper application (CAF1). Suffolk County Council is unable to acknowledge receipt of paper applications and therefore suggest that proof of posting is obtained.

If families are planning to move house or think their circumstances may change before next September, it is still important to make an application on time using the current address. It is recommended to apply for schools based on the current address in case the proposed move falls through. Advice and guidance about this process is available at [www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissions](http://www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissions).

Families who apply online will be able to log on to the Online Service on National Offer Day, which is Monday 2 March 2026 for secondary school places and Thursday 16 April 2026 for primary school places, to see their offer of a school place, and they will receive an email to

confirm this offer on the same day. Offer letters will be sent by second class post to applicants who made a paper application. Information to help parents and carers make their application is available at [www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissions](http://www.suffolk.gov.uk/admissions).

### **Second year of £500,000 Culture Project Fund launched**

Suffolk County Council is pleased to announce the second year of its £500,000 Culture Project Fund. The fund offers three tiers of grants:

Small grants up to £1,500

Medium grants up to £10,000

Large grants up to £20,000

This inclusive approach ensures that both grassroots ventures and larger, more established organisations have equal opportunities to access funding. Eligible applicants include Arts and Museum organisations which operate as skilled freelancers, registered charities, community interest companies, non-profits, and social enterprises based in Suffolk. The fund supports both capital and revenue projects, with a maximum of £10,000 available for capital expenditure. The second year of the Culture Project Fund marks a significant investment in the future of Suffolk's cultural sector and underlines our commitment to investment in Arts and Museums . By supporting projects that focus on our key priorities, we aim to create happier, healthier, and more united communities. This fund is about more than just arts and culture, it's about building resilience, fostering inclusion, and boosting the wellbeing of our residents. We're excited to see the positive impact these projects will have on our county. The culture project fund will support projects that have been designed to reach, engage and inspire people and communities to take part in and enjoy arts and museums. The fund is particularly to support projects that reach some of our most vulnerable people and communities with an application process that is streamlined and accessible. This includes activities designed for those on low incomes, isolated individuals, and marginalised groups, the fund aims to support projects that enhance both mental and physical health, creating resilience and improving overall wellbeing through inclusive and accessible activities. Furthermore, the fund aims to strengthen Suffolk's economy by supporting projects that enhance skills development, promote social enterprises, and attract visitors. By focusing on these areas, the Council seeks to foster a thriving cultural sector that contributes to the county's growth. ### **Saving Suffolk £39.4 million a year & enhancing local services – One Suffolk plan revealed**

Millions of pounds of public money would be saved and reinvested in frontline services and benefits for the whole of Suffolk, if the Government backs a new plan published on Monday 8 September. The ambitious proposal will see all of Suffolk's six councils abolished and replaced with one new unitary council - which would deliver both local and county-wide services. The One Suffolk business case demonstrates that a single unitary for Suffolk will save £78.2 million after the first five years, while three councils would cost an eye-watering £145.3 million more than the current two-tier system. After the first five years, one council would save £39.4 million a year, whereas three would cost £13.1 million more than the current model. The business case is built on rigorous financial analysis of Suffolk-based data conducted by global advisory firm Grant Thornton, rather than generic national modelling. One Suffolk would have the capacity to create real improvements to council services which would benefit everyone, including:

- Improved financial resilience, enabling the unitary council to free up resources for frontline services and keep council tax as low as possible.
- Harmonising Council Tax to the lowest level across Suffolk. Based on current levels this would result in Band D properties seeing a reduction of £245 in Ipswich, £17 in East Suffolk, £29 in West Suffolk, £19 in Babergh and a freeze in Mid Suffolk.
- A new deal for market towns, including Ipswich, backed by a £40m capital investment fund, and a review of car parking charges and markets conducted in consultation with traders, businesses and representative bodies.
- Empowering communities by offering powers and funding to town and parish councils where these councils express a desire for additional responsibilities. Creating a new town council for Ipswich to enhance democratic representation.
- A proactive and revitalised highways service that says 'yes' more - acting swiftly, communicating clearly and delivering more.
- Creating a unified planning framework that delivers greater consistency, efficiency, and strategic alignment across Suffolk, paired with local planning committees so decisions are made close to home.
- Leveraging technology and innovation to create a modern council prepared for future challenges.
- Building a strong, flourishing, and resilient local economy that serves all residents, businesses, and communities.
- A stronger voice for Suffolk through effective collaboration with the new mayor, focusing on clear investment priorities that maximise benefits.

I am certain that One Suffolk will deliver the greatest possible savings and the greatest improvement to services of any of the proposals put to government. It will save a net £39.4m each year, which, amongst other things, will enable the new council to establish a new locality model backed by 16 locality teams, empower towns and parish councils that want to do more to take on funding and responsibilities, and deliver initiatives like a new deal for Market Towns and Ipswich which is backed by a £40m capital investment pot and a full review of car

parking and markets conducted hand-in-hand with business. When we go through a process like this and tell residents it will save money, it is only fair they feel that benefit on day one of the new council. That is why we back harmonising Council Tax to the lowest level in Suffolk. Currently this would see everyone in Suffolk have their bills reduced, apart from in Mid Suffolk where bills would be frozen at the same level. We are very clear that this would be a brand-new council with a new culture and a new relationship with residents, businesses, community and voluntary organisations and town and parish councils. Too often our existing councils, both county and district or borough, start from a position of no. We've heard this loud and clear and have built the One Suffolk proposal around enabling what people want to see locally and giving them access to their local council.

I want to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their engagement with the One Suffolk campaign. We spoke directly to residents, members of the business community, voluntary, community, faith and social enterprises, parish and town councils, and political stakeholders and other key influencers. Together we have created a plan for Suffolk that we can all proudly stand behind. One Suffolk was developed by Suffolk County Council in response to Government's call to reorganise local government across the country and move away from the current two-tier system that has been in place since 1974. Under the One Suffolk proposal is the creation of a brand-new organisation with new councillors, innovative service delivery methods, and streamlined local communications and accountability. This isn't just a continuation or expansion of the existing structure. One Suffolk will forge new relationships with town and parish councils, businesses, voluntary groups, and public sector organisations. The alternative proposal from the districts and borough councils, to split Suffolk into three arbitrary council areas, could put key services such as social care at serious risk. It would also cost many millions to set up. By creating three new areas across Suffolk, essential county-wide services like adult social care and children's services must be disaggregated - resulting in higher costs and a postcode lottery for the county's most vulnerable residents. The One Suffolk campaign engaged communities from across Suffolk, with 8,189 responses to our Residents' Survey. This made it the largest survey response rate for the county council in the past decade.

### **300th No Cold Calling Zone launched during Trusted Trader Week**

The new zone was created following an incident where a doorstep caller approached a resident offering to clean her driveway for £400. The men then pressured her into making cash withdrawals, escorting her to a local bank where they helped her withdraw two sums of money totalling £400. The driveway was only partially cleaned and dirt was deliberately sprayed over her property and vehicles. The launch of this milestone zone takes place during Trusted Trader Week, which highlights the work Suffolk Trading Standards does to protect residents from rogue traders and promote vetted, reliable businesses through the Suffolk Trusted Trader scheme. Doorstep cold callers can often turn out to be unscrupulous people who prey on the elderly and vulnerable in their homes, the very place where they should feel safest. No Cold Calling Zones help deter such behaviour by making it clear that residents in that zone will not deal with traders who knock at their door uninvited. I applaud the hard work of the community, councillors, police and Trading Standards in bringing this milestone zone into place. These schemes are proven to have a deterrent effect, and I am proud that Suffolk now has 300 in operation. I urge residents that are looking to have work undertaken in their home to get quotes from two or three traders. Ask friends and family for



recommendations of traders who have carried out work for them. You can also check Suffolk Trusted Trader for traders that have been vetted and approved by us. A 'No Cold Calling Zone' is a nominated area where residents collectively state they do not want uninvited traders calling at their homes. Zones are established in response to incidents of doorstep crime, distraction burglary, or where there is a community more vulnerable to such practices. Residents in a nominated area are consulted and, with their agreement, receive an information pack, door sticker, and street signage to reinforce the message. Since the first zone was launched in Ipswich in 2009, more than 14,300 properties across Suffolk are now covered. Anyone wishing to nominate their road can visit the 'No Cold Calling' page on the **Suffolk County Council website**.

### **Don't Go It Alone: Join Your Local Stop Smoking Group This Stoptober**

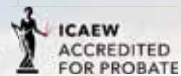

This is one of my favourite photographs from Earl Stonham: A look back at the village, published by the Parish Council in 2001. Taken in 1937, it shows one of four sets of threshing tackle owned by the Chappell family, providing a service to farmers in the district, as far afield as Debenham. All four engines, including this Burrell, were scrapped in the 1950s. I have driven a similar engine a short distance. They are unwieldy beasts: negotiating narrow country lanes and congested farmyards with a threshing drum and straw elevator behind must have required a great deal of skill.

# EARL STONHAM GOLDEN CIRCLE

In March Chris Parfitt gave his illustrated talk titled 'On the Trail of St Edmund'. Edmund the Martyr, also known as St Edmund, was king of East Anglia and the patron saint of England for 500 years. He died in November 869 after being captured by the Vikings. Following on from the life of Edmund, in May Horry Parsons gave us a very interesting talk on the building of St Edmundsbury Cathedral Tower.

Horry was the project manager during the build which started in 2000, part of the Millenium Project. Prince Charles was the patron and laid the first brick of the total 600,000 bricks used in the construction. The tower was built without the use of steel, in the medieval way using bricks faced with stone. It was designed to last 1000 years. The tower was officially opened in 2005.

On a fine sunny day in June, for our first and only coach trip of the year, we visited the Jacobean Blickling Hall, a National Trust property near Aylsham in Norfolk. Built from 1616, Anne Boleyn was born in the Hall. When we arrived at the entrance gate, we were welcomed by a nice young lady from the National Trust who directed us to the shops, cafe and toilets. We were then free to view the house, garden and shops at our leisure.

In July we celebrated the Club's birthday with lunch at the Stowmarket Golf Club, and in August 23 of our members enjoyed an informal barbecue lunch in the Club Room of the Village Hall. The last outing of the year, in September, was another visit to 'The Hut' on the sea front in Felixstowe.

The speaker at our Harvest Festival in October was Mike Smith from the Stowmarket Foodbank. Launched in 2012 to give emergency temporary support for those in need, the foodbank operates a pop-up shop where anybody can fill a carrier bag for a small donation. The volunteers help with small jobs like grass cutting.

Our annual meeting is in November. The Christmas meal in December will

be in the Village Hall, catering by Jenny Johnson and her team.
