EARL STONHAM PARISH COUNCIL NEWS



Welcome to the Spring edition of the Recorder, which is available in both print and online versions as usual. You may have heard that from 2024 we will be publishing **three** editions (rather than 4) because of savings needing to be made by the Parish Council.

Whenever I meet other people out walking their dogs, conversation inevitably drifts onto the weather and how

wet it has been and the effect on all the footpaths, as well as the fields, which means that local famers have struggled to get onto them with their tractors and other machinery. Let us hope with this Spring Edition of the Recorder we can look forward to a more settled spell of warmer and drier weather.

The Parish Council meets every other month with additional special meetings called as required. Dates of meetings are shown below and agendas, papers and key documents can be found in the Parish Council pages on the village web site.

Updates:

- The Parish Council continues to consider Planning Applications and submit views to Mid Suffolk District Council as part of the planning process.
- Low Carbon have submitted revised plans and background documents for Willow Solar Farm on agricultural land to the west of Blacksmiths Lane. The Parish Council held a Special Meeting on 5 February to consider and discuss the revisions. 30 local residents attended with Cllr Nick Hardingham, 2 representatives of Low Carbon (the Developer) and a representative from Suffolk Wildlife Trust. A lively debate ensued and most residents were opposed to the scheme. The Parish Council submitted its continued opposition to the proposed development to Mid Suffolk District Council.
- Norwich to Tilbury is the new name for East Anglia Green. Opposition to the proposals continues to remain strong with Councils, MPs and

Communities across East Anglia totally opposed to the proposals for pylons with an offshore solution preferred. The Essex, Suffolk, Norfolk Pylons Group continue to be active in their opposition of the current proposal by National Grid.

- I am still not able to report on web site activity as Google upgraded Google Analytics to version 4 which seems to have broken all our links.
- Suffolk County Council's contractor has now completed work to replace the remaining 5 streetlamps with LED lamps.
- This will also enable us to follow up with Suffolk Highways on options to mitigate the excess speed through the 30mph limit in the village.
- The Tree Surgeon felled one Ash tree and cut back several other Ash trees at the allotments in November 2023. These works were necessary due to Ash Die Back disease.
- We are currently carrying out Thermal Imaging Surveys for homeowners who applied to participate in the project. By the end of February we will have completed 25 surveys and feedback to homeowners on the results of the surveys, as well as tips and ideas for simple improvement. Thanks to Tony Turner, Mark Harper, Mike Anthony, Hugh Cumberland and Dawn Gillett for helping me with this project.

Budget 2024/25

In January each year the Parish Council must set a balanced budget. Our budget for 2024/25 is £7,675 compared with £7,330 for last year (2023/24). Our income derives from the Precept - a tax, included within Mid Suffolk Council Tax, which enables the Parish Council to perform its functions. Parish Councils can apply for other funding such as grants and funding awards, generally for specific projects, but they do not receive funds directly from Central Government. In 2024/25 our Precept for a Band D Property in Earl Stonham will be £28.99. Last year it was £27.67, an increase of 4.75%.

It is always a challenge to set a Budget that balances the need to raise income to match expenditure while keeping any increase in the Precept to a minimum, especially given the current financial impacts being felt by everyone. We are also constrained by the fact that many of the re-charges for the services we provide are set externally e.g grass cutting, bin emptying, streetlights and have seen significant increases recently. Speeding:

The Earl Stonham Speed Watch Team have started the new year at a steady pace, not helped by the poor weather and dark mornings and evenings. Gradually light is returning so the number of sessions should start to increase, availability of volunteers permitting.

The following is a summary of sessions in 2024 to date

- In total 7 sessions have been completed at varying times of the day totalling some 6 hours
- Within these sessions, a total of 113 vehicles have been reported to the Police for travelling more than the speed limit (anything 35 and above to allow for camera error).
- Across the 113 vehicles, the average speed was 38mph however the following speeds were noted and reported as 'excessive' from each session, 41mph (2), 42mph (3), 43mph (1), 46mph (1), 54mph (1) and 59mph (1)

All recorded as travelling over 40 get a strong warning from the Police and those over 50, a knock on the door and visit in person from an officer – let's hope this works! 

Year 20 is just around the corner!!

Last year took us by surprise and demand for our plants was very high from day one, and as a result we were forced to close early. To try and avoid the same scenario this year we have been propagating plants all thru the close season. After a much needed break away in January things on the nursery are moving forwards slowly. The dull, cool, wet weather has not been conducive for growing plants. The winter rains have continued and I have lost count of the number of times the polytunnel has flooded. Fingers crossed for some warm sun soon.! Potting of the bare-root plants is going well with over 4000 plants potted and we are now putting thousands of 9cm plants into their final pots.

Our compost sold very well last year and is available now.

As an NHS hospital doctor who has worked in some of the biggest and best London Hospitals throughout my medical career, I am only too familiar with the signs and symptoms of Measles. Measles is an illness with unpleasant and sometimes life-threatening complications; a virus that Britain had hoped to eradicate through a vaccination programme delivering herd immunity, but unfortunately, parents failing to vaccinate their children has resulted in a loss of herd immunity and a recent surge in Measles cases.

Until recently, herd immunity had meant that cases of Measles had been isolated to small outbreaks in London and the big cities. However, the loss of herd immunity means that we are now seeing a surge of cases throughout the United Kingdom.

Herd immunity is where the spread of an infectious disease within a population is prevented by the pre-existing immunity of a high proportion of people within that population. In Britain, herd immunity against Measles had, in the past, been conveyed by an effective vaccination program – which in recent years meant a two-dose course of the MMR (Measles, Mumps and Rubella) triple vaccine administered before a child's 5th birthday.

The MMR vaccine is routinely offered by health visitors and GPs. Herd immunity against Measles is achieved when 95% or more of the population have gained immunity. But in parts of London and Birmingham, less than 70% of the population have completed the MMR vaccination course by their 5th birthday. In Suffolk, the picture is better, with 89.1% of children being fully vaccinated by their 5th birthday but this is insufficient to convey herd immunity, and means that over 1 in 10 children in our county are not fully protected against the Measles Virus.

Measles is not an illness to be dismissed lightly. It is highly contagious with an R rate (or reproduction rate) of between 15 and 16. When compared to the R rate of the first strain of COVID-19 of between 2 and 3, it is clear that Measles spreads easily and quickly in the unvaccinated. The school classroom is particularly fertile territory for the Measles virus to spread.

The reason why vaccination against Measles is so important is because it can result in serious and life-threatening complications including pneumonia, meningitis, blindness and seizures. In pregnancy, Measles can cause miscarriage, still birth and premature labour.

The task now is to restore herd immunity against Measles. If you or your child or grandchild has not completed the MMR vaccination course, then please book an appointment with your GP. It may just save a child's life.

One Network

This is a quick reminder about the website <u>one.network</u>. It is a free-to-view website, with large-ranging sources of roadworks and traffic disruption information in the UK. The one.network map enables highway authorities to communicate authoritative up-to-date information about roadworks, events and other activities on the highway. Users can register for email alerts about upcoming roadworks

affecting their area. This is particularly useful for informing residents on future works.

Suffolk DVD counterfeiter receives suspended sentence

A man who made thousands of pounds from pirating DVDs of films and TV shows has been given a suspended prison sentence following a case brought by Suffolk County Council's Trading Standards team. John Williams received a 16-month term, suspended for two years, plus a fine of £7,500 after pleading guilty to two offences related to the sale, supply and manufacture of counterfeit DVDs.

Williams, 72, of Pot Kiln Road, Great Cornard, Suffolk, was also ordered by Ipswich Crown Court to pay a Proceeds of Crime Order of £77,182, as the criminal benefit he made from the sales of counterfeit discs, plus pay prosecution costs of £42,870. Suffolk Trading Standards began investigating after receiving a report of fake cult and classic DVDs being sold online. More than 40,000 copied DVDs were seized from his home in October 2021 along with computers, disc burners, a colour photocopier with print outs of DVD box paper insert sleeves, and address label stickers.

Williams pleaded guilty to one offence under the Copyright, Designs and Patents Act 1998 and one under the Trademark Act 1994. Anyone wanting to report the sale of illegal goods should contact Trading Standards via Citizens Advice Consumer Service on 0808 223 1133.

Fake university website shut down by Suffolk Trading Standards

A website for a fake university aiming to scam money from overseas students has been shut down by Suffolk Trading Standards. Calling itself the College of Suffolk, the website claimed the university had been founded in 1990 and was located on Queen Street in Ipswich. Quoting yearly fees ranging from £3,500 to £8,900, it claimed to offer courses in acting, musical theatre, dance and performance. The site used images of the real University of Suffolk and even had a page promoting the county, saying how it was home to its own breed of horses, breweries and famous celebrities such as singer Ed Sheeran.

A foreword by college 'President' Dr Stephen Spinks talked of how it provides "exciting learning opportunities in business, human resources, accountancy, finance, musician (sic) and art – all critical areas for the world of work." It is the second time such a fake college has been foiled by Trading Standards - an identical scam using the same name and information was closed down in 2019. The website was being run from Hong Kong and while Suffolk Trading Standards have had no reports of victims in the UK there may be some overseas. A degree from a British college or university is an enticing prospect for an overseas student and those behind this scam were trying to exploit that. Thankfully the vigilance of Suffolk Trading Standards has prevented this website from trying to pick up where it would appear to have previously left off and will not be conning people into paying for non-existent courses. Trading Standards says anyone considering applying for a college course can beat degree fraud through the Higher Education Degree Datacheck (HEDD) website https://hedd.ac.uk/ where people can check whether a university or college is an official degree awarding body by using the look-up service

Degree fraud can be reported to the HEDD fraud team on 020 8148 2400. If you have concerns about a website, please report it to Trading Standards via 0808 223 1133.

Suffolk local area partnership commits to urgent improvements to SEND services and apologises to families

The partnership responsible for overseeing and delivering services for children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) in Suffolk have apologised to families and commits to urgent action to strengthen and accelerate improvement plans following an inspection by Ofsted and the Care Quality Commission. Ofsted and CQC Inspection Report finds significant concerns with SEND services The Local Area Partnership promise urgent action to accelerate and strengthen improvement plans Senior leaders offer joint

apology to Suffolk families The inspection, which took place in November, highlighted that 'there are widespread and/or systemic failings leading to significant concerns' about the experiences and outcomes of children and young people with SEND. The local area partnership which delivers SEND services is made up of Suffolk County Council, the NHS Suffolk and North East Essex Integrated Care Board (ICB) and NHS Norfolk and Waveney ICB. The inspection report, published January 30th, identifies two priority actions as follows:

- 1. The partnership should work more collaboratively and effectively to improve strategic planning. This needs to deliver systems with measurable impact that will create better experiences and outcomes for children and young people with SEND.
- 2. Leaders should cooperate to take urgent action to improve the timeliness and quality of the statutory Education Health Care plan process, Education Health Care plan needs assessments and Education Health Care plans and annual reviews. This should ensure that plans meaningfully capture the views and aspirations of children and young people with SEND and their families, so that they get the right support at the right time.

The local area partnership is now implementing a number of urgent actions. These include the proposed investment of £4.4 million into SEND services next year by Suffolk County Council and the establishment of a Suffolk SEND Improvement Board, which will be chaired by an Independent Chair, to oversee the improvement plan and actions needed. A new SEND Strategy is also in the process of being co-produced with parents and carers to set the strategic direction. We accept that our improvement work has not yet had the positive impact on the experience of children and young people with SEND and their families in Suffolk. This is not good enough and I apologise to children and young people and their families. We accept the findings of the report and we must now go further and faster as a partnership to deliver the urgent improvements needed.

Our SEND staff work with passion and conviction every day to make children's lives better and it is important to recognise this and thank them for their ongoing hard work and commitment. We understand the challenges that colleagues face and that is why SCC will continue to work with senior leaders from the NHS to strengthen changes to make a difference. As a result of this inspection, a monitoring inspection will be carried out within approximately 18 months. The

local area partnership is now required to prepare and submit a plan to address the identified areas for priority action.

Significant pieces of reform include:

Investment of more than £55 million to create more than 1,250 additional places in specialist and mainstream schools

Creation of specialist SEND support teams and training for all Suffolk schools to support them to meet the additional needs of children in mainstream schools

Proposed investment of £4.4m in 2024/25 and £3.4m in 2025/26 to expand our statutory SEND teams and secure sufficient educational psychology resource to improve the quality and timeliness of Education Health and Care assessments and reviews

The ICB has invested £700,000 in recurring funding in the voluntary and community sector to provide support for families waiting for these diagnoses, as well as co-producing a new parent resource pack as part of the Suffolk Local Offer





FROM YOUR LOCAL RECORDER John Jones

The celebrations in the village to celebrate the Coronation last year were the continuation of a very long tradition. As well as national celebrations, religious holidays were the occasion of feasting, in the way that we still do at Christmas. One such feast day was All Saints (1st November), as shown by this 1708 agreement written on the back page of the Churchwardens' account book:

"All Saints 1708. Item: Agreed then by the feoffees [trustees] & churchwardens of this said towne of Stonham Comtis that hereafter none shall have their dinner at All Saints upon the towne's account but only the feoffees, churchwardens and constables."

The Rector, Thomas Ventris, and seven other local officials who signed the agreement are, of course, in future to be the only recipients of free meals. It is intriguing to speculate on the events that prompted this agreement: was there an ever-growing number of hangers-on expecting to have their meal without paying or were the officers dealing with one pushy individual who was asserting an unwarranted claim?

EARL STONHAM VILLAGE HALL



The Stonham Theatre Guild is one of the biggest users of the hall with a large number of bookings for Pantomime rehearsals and performances. This year the pantomime was again held in January and proved a huge success.

There was a down-side however as a large drink was spilt and by the time it was discovered, it had damaged the hall floor. Fortunately this has dried back so the damage is not as bad as first feared but it does mean we will need to restrict drinks being taken into the hall **when seating in rows** is being used. I hope everyone will understand the reasons for this as even a small repair to the floor surface costs several thousand pounds to repair as the floor has to be sanded and revarnished.

D-Day Anniversary & Funday

As reported in the last Recorder, the Village Hall Committee will be organising a number of events around the time of the 80th anniversary of D Day. On the evening of Thursday 6th June we will be lighting the beacon on the green and there will be complimentary nibbles and a glass of fizz, so please come along at 8.30pm. We have brought the monthly supper evening in June forward to the 8th and will be serving a special wartime (read rationing!) themed meal. Sunday 9th will be a village fun day with a 1940's theme. This is still in the planning stages but will include a 'bring and share' lunch with a pay bar. We are also hoping to have military vehicles, swing dancing and other entertainment. If you have any suggestions for the day or would like to help in any way, please do get in touch. More information will be on village noticeboards & email list as the date approaches. There is also a poster in the edition of the Recorder.

Sadly the tenant who was using the Bowls Club premises proved to be rather-short lived and moved out in December. We also discovered with all the rain that we were having, that the rear wall of the Bowls clubhouse not only had some problems with weather proofing but also some serious structural issues as well. Urgent work had to be done to rebuild the wall and externally clad it to make the building sound again. We therefore have a weathertight building and are again looking for potential uses. The car park extension has been used quite regularly and even with the heavy rain has not become waterlogged, so that is a very welcome addition to the village hall facilities.

Every year, the hall has a regular slot to undertake essential cleaning and maintenance in order to keep everywhere looking its best. This year we have reserved **Tuesday 21st to Friday 24**th **May** for this and as always, would really welcome volunteers to help with the work. 
